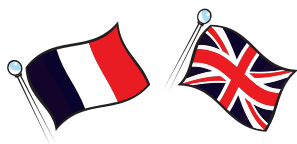


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Broadclyst now fully twinned with Plobannalec-Lesconil



A large group of 39 Broadclyst residents- around 25 twinnings and 14 musicians- invaded Brittany by sea on the weekend of the 2nd-6th of June. Several parish councillors, a fair few twinnings, a dozen members of Broadclyst's Cantilena choir and a trio from South West Horns based in the parish were all treated to a four-day whirl of formal, social, culinary and touristic engagements around the beautiful villages of Plobannalec-Lesconil (P-L for short).

On the menu was a delicious and enormous array of local food and drink. The twinnings had taken the precaution of taking along a Met Office hostage, resulting in glorious 28C weather and cloudless skies. Entertainment varied from a wonderful choral concert in the church sung by Cantilena and their Breton "twin" Tud Ar Vro, a lot of spontaneous singing by both the French and visiting English, an impromptu Chippendales number by local fire chief Philippe, and the unforgettable "In the Navy" danced in bin bags and Breton coif by P-L's Dominique, Stéphanie, Marc and Chantal.

But enough about the fun. The serious part of the weekend was the second leg of the charter signing ceremony, which BTA

chairman Ted Traer, P-L twinning president Dominique Mevel, Cllr Chris Pepper and Cllr Derek Button were proud to be able to see to its conclusion.

In a weekend of gift-giving and receiving, BTA presented P-L with a green oak donated by the NT which was planted to a horn fanfare outside the Mairie in P-L to echo the symbolic oaks in our

village centre, along with a commemorative plaque donated by the twinning association. Allusions were made in subsequent speeches to both villages' desire to see our friendship grow as we hope the tree will. A number P-L adults and children came in their beautiful traditional embroidered heavy black Breton costume and coifs, no mean feat in the soaring heat.

Later the charter was formally signed in three different languages - English, Breton and French, each version read out by a different child during the signing ceremony.

Ted Traer was officially presented with one copy of the charter, which will be framed and erected in Broadclyst in due course.

Tribute was paid during the weekend to all the people who had helped make the twinning the success it is certainly becoming, including past twinning presidents in P-L and all the people very actively involved on both sides of the Channel. A twinning is not just about the food and drink (although they are excellent) nor is it just about the yearly visits to and fro- it is about the links that grow more or less spontaneously between various groups within the villages, and about what each village can learn from the other. It is about the cultural, educational and sporting exchanges so carefully nurtured, about

developing communication between the two communities so that people begin to feel that the twin village is a real home from home. Several projects are planned, including a camping trip to Caddihoe by a group of P-L 11 and 12 year olds in early July

There are plans to try to link various other clubs and organisations within the two villages. Our challenge as a twinning group in the coming months and years is to help nurture and develop these links. 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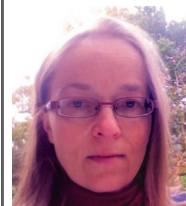

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award

If you want the opportunity to meet new people, try something you've never done before, or to become more physically active, then the Duke of Edinburgh's award might be your thing!

There are 3 stages to the award; Bronze, Silver, and Gold, and you can only progress once the first is completed. The Bronze award consists of four sections; a physical activity, a service which may involve your community, a skill which you have never tried before, and a



2 day expedition. The Silver award requires some more commitment as the expedition is a day longer, and the

physical recreation lasting 6 months instead of 3 for Bronze. The Gold award requires a 4 day expedition and a further 3 months for each section.

The expeditions are a great way to make new friends and learn some useful navigation techniques which will help with other outdoor pursuits in the South West such as Ten Tors, especially because Dartmoor is a popular place for DofE expeditions.

Another good way to meet new people and learn some useful skills is in the service section of the award. Currently I'm doing my Silver Award through Exeter School and doing my service with the Broadclyst Parish Council. For my Bronze award I completed



a First Aid course which is a useful skill to have. For the council, I have delivered the Broadsheets and helped out at a few community gatherings such as Mothers' Day and the monthly coffee morning. In the near future I am going to be helping out at the Broadclyst Fun Day, which should be a fun-filled day for the whole community.

If you wish to try something new for the first time, the skill section of the award would be perfect for you! You have to spend at least 3 months completing the skill but a lot of people decide to carry on afterwards. For example, for Bronze, I decided to try something completely different which I had always wanted to try, unicycling, and I have been practicing ever since.

The final section of the award is the physical recreation. You can do anything from table tennis to rock climbing and it's a great way to keep fit and meet new people. This could lead to playing the sport on a more competitive basis, for example, I play tennis at Victoria Park in Exeter for my sport and have entered a few tournaments along the way.

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Killerton launches parkrun



Killerton is delighted to be the first parkrun venue for the West Country and for the National Trust!

'parkrun' is a free 5k running event open to runners of all standards and ages taking place every Saturday of the year at 9am.

There are parkruns right across the UK, Australia and



Denmark but before Killerton successfully made their proposal to be a venue there was sadly not a single parkrun event in the West Country.

Like the National Trust, parkrun's ethos is to break down barriers and engage with the local community. Through providing a 5k parkrun course at Killerton we aim to get more people enjoying our wider estate more often, give local people access to the beautiful countryside on their doorstep and build support for the National Trust's work.

Killerton parkrun is founded on a close working partnership with a number of local running clubs, athletics groups, Exeter University and the parkrun headquarters team in London. We have quickly established it

as a community event with a strong loyalty from runners and local people, and it is only made possible by volunteers, who organise, marshal and safely deliver the event for us every week.

Since Killerton parkrun launched on 30 April, the event has already achieved a strong following. Killerton's Countryside Team has helped to create the safe scenic route through the park which is so unique it is now attracting runners from London who stay in local B&Bs.

We have attracted a nice mix of serious athletes, just for fun runners, parents running with youngsters, dads running with pushchairs and those who simply take part for the social

aspect. Killerton's tea room now opens two hours early on a Saturday for runners, volunteers and spectators to enjoy a post-run social before heading home.

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Recipe for making Broadclyst Bangers

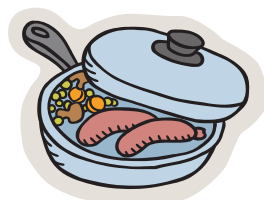
Forget buying those mysterious envelopes of grey matter encased in plastic skins from your supermarket and make some real sausages with meat from your local butcher, or when available from Broadclyst Community Farm.

Martin Gibbins, your local butcher at Pinhoe, (01392 467601) will not only provide you with the right mixture of pork to make your sausages but if you ask him nicely he will also mince the pork and provide you with some natural sausage skins. The recipe below is a basic

BROADCLYST BANGER recipe and you can tweak the herbs and spices to suit your particular taste (or add your secret ingredient). If you do

not wish to use sausage skins, it is easy to roll the sausage mixture in flour to form individual sausages to the preferred diameter and length.

Children will love to make these BROADCLYST BANGERS to their own secret recipe and size/shapes; you could also have a family competition to see who can make the best BROADCLYST BANGERS.



INGREDIENTS:

2lb Pork (fat and lean, without skin or gristle);
1lb of suet,
½ lb breadcrumbs,
grated rind of ½ a lemon,
¼ teaspoon grated nutmeg,
6 sage leaves chopped finely (or equivalent dried sage),
1/2 teaspoon of mixed herbs salt and pepper to suit your taste,
¼ teaspoon of marjoram .



METHOD:

Chop or mince the pork and suet finely . Add the crumbs, lemon rind, nutmeg, seasoning and herbs and mix thoroughly. Put into skins or roll pieces of the mixture in flour to the shape and sizes of sausages or alternatively form the mixture into little flattened cakes and fry.

What is it?

Summerfest is a community fund-raising event involving local musicians raising money for local charities. This event is raising funds for two important local charities,

Clyst Caring and Unlimited

Clyst Caring

Supports local residents by providing care and transport and general support for the elderly, infirm and disabled residents of Broadclyst and Pinhoe. Their work is highly valued but they have recently suffered cuts in their grant aid from local councils. This is our opportunity to show them that we care about and support their work.

Unlimited

Is a youth outreach project run by Rev. James Greer (Vicar of the local team). They are urgently in need of funds to enable them to provide for a wider range of opportunities for local youngsters. Again, this is a superb opportunity to show them that we support their efforts.

Cllr Peter Bowden - Devon County and East Devon District Councillor

This report covers some decisions and deliberations that have made headlines during the past year.

We began with a huge reduction in Formula Grants to both Council and District, and exhortations from government that all Council Taxes will be frozen for three years. The impact was expected to be profound and in some ways this is true. All the same, virtually all frontline services remain intact. This has been achieved by real changes to the organisations of both District and County authorities.

The Police service has undergone serious review and change. Many areas of East Devon, including Broadclyst and surrounding parishes will lose well-known and respected police officers to other areas as force numbers are reduced. In paying tribute to Buffie, Jim and Anita, I welcome

Stephen Trail as our PCSO and I personally thank Sgt. Simon Tennent for his reassurance and continued support.

The consequence of the reductions in budgets and local grants has been the real need to review and question the level of frontline service and its actual cost in all areas of the council's business. These reviews are ongoing, and as an example, I recently spent some hours with a group of Young Carers (children under the age of 18 who care for sick or disabled family members). By listening to the youngsters themselves, together with their carers and social workers, we are able to reach a far better understanding of the actual needs we should meet from a diminishing budget.

One issue that I continue to address relates to the unintended consequences of

decisions that give rise to problems we ought to have foreseen, for example the decision to raise charges at County Tips for "builders' rubble, plasterboard, asbestos and car tyres". That there would be an increase in fly-tipping may not be a surprise, but that this increase is almost wholly related to domestic waste that can be taken to the tip for free is disturbing. Concerns regarding recycling cardboard have been well-voiced and EDDC is in discussion to find ways to extend the recycling scheme to include cardboard and 'other plastics'.

Recently the over-riding issue within this parish relates to development and its related planning matters and EDDC has reaffirmed a determination to listen more carefully to the views of the Parish. The government have now agreed that Regional Plans will be replaced by locally produced Local Development Plans, which will incorporate Community Plans. The localism agenda is to feature



highly in this process and the full backing of EDDC's leadership is assured. Other concerns in Broadclyst are the problems of traffic, parking and speeding and the recently formed Traffic Group are regularly meeting to work on these issues.

Finally I wish to pay tribute to the many people, without whom communities would struggle to survive. Some £5000 to date of my Locality Budget has been spent in the village, all of it in response to initiatives driven by local people and encouraged by the Parish Council.. Thank you to you all.

The Broadclyst Traffic Group

The Broadclyst Traffic Group set up with the full backing of the Parish Council and, chaired by recently re-elected District Councillor Derek Button is tasked with campaigning for more effective traffic calming solutions in our Parish.

Just a matter of time! It is just a matter of time before we see a serious accident happen in the Parish of Broadclyst. It is of great concern to many residents in the Parish and it is now time to act!

The numbers of vehicles now passing through the Parish has markedly increased over the past few years to a situation now where we have an almost constant flow of traffic using the B3181 through our village. A volume which could and has risen significantly as the B3181 is the official relief road for the M5.

With increased volume comes increased speed and dangerous driving which we can see clearly on a daily basis. The 30mph limit on the B3181 is virtually ignored by the majority of drivers and with little or no traffic calming in place, destroys the atmosphere

of our village.

With a Primary School at one end and a Community College at the other it is imperative that more work is done to relieve and calm the traffic throughout the Parish.

It could be your child!

Examples:

Station Road Traffic in Station Road has increased significantly over the years due to:

- Growth of Clyst Vale Community College
- 'Rat-run' for drivers accessing Exeter and M5 / A30 etc

A vehicle count over a week in February 2010 recorded an average of almost 600 vehicles using Station Road between 0800 and 0900 on weekdays, volumes for which

the road was simply not designed. The majority of these vehicles had only one or two occupants. The current situation will be further exacerbated with the new town of Cranbrook.

This increase together with falling driving standards and a

lack of policing has resulted in a number of vehicles being damaged. Fortunately there have not been any serious accidents or fatalities...yet! However, unless concerted action is taken and individuals and organisations take responsibility for a resolution, it will happen. **Remember, it could be your child!**

Old Coach Road The current traffic calming measures on Old Coach Road are no match for the careless drivers racing off the B3181, the massive tractors and trailers, the speeding delivery lorries and transit vans, the School buses taking their daily short cut and the motor bikes on their route to nowhere.

Never mind the fact that local residents are having to almost risk their lives to cross a road to their gardens, there are school children and pedestrians walking up and down this road at all times of the day and an increasing number of families with small children living on Old Coach Road. **It is just a matter of time and it could be your child!**



Community Speed Watch is on its way! The sheer volume and weight of traffic speeding around the Parish at all times of the day, increasing at peak times and at school pick-up and drop-off times, is becoming dangerous and distressing to many local residents.

Broadclyst Traffic Group is working with local Police to set up a Community Speed Watch in the Parish of Broadclyst. This Project is designed to increase driver awareness and be a visible deterrent against speeding motorists. Volunteers will be trained to use a speed gun and monitor, record and input traffic data. This is a clear opportunity for residents to act in support of the Community.

Neighbourhood Assessment

A neighbourhood assessment will be carried out in Broadclyst on **30th June 2011**. EDDC's Environmental Health staff will work in partnership with local Police to carry out a door to door survey at various properties throughout the village of Broadclyst.

Residents will be asked whether they have any concerns or complaints about their neighbourhood and whether there is anything they would like to see improved. Issues such as anti-social

behaviour, crime or traffic problems can be discussed with the local Police and PCSOs.

Environmental Health staff will be on hand to discuss many topics including; rats/mice, noise complaints, bonfires, litter, flytipping, dog fouling, waste and recycling, housing problems and pollution. StreetScene operatives will also be in the area to carry out street cleaning and deal with any litter problems reported at the time.

Officers will also offer advice and information about grants for insulation & central heating. Assistance around the house by Devon Care & Repair for the elderly, vulnerable or disabled and details about Home Safeguard 24 hour emergency alarms.

The British Red Cross will also join the teams to offer residents of Broadclyst a free 2 hour basic life saving course. If sufficient people wish to attend the course, it will be organised for a later date in the village.

There will also be a **DROP-IN**

SURGERY in the Green Room at the Victory Hall. **An Environmental Health Officer will be on hand from 10a.m to 3.30 p.m.** Any resident from the Broadclyst parish may call in for advice and discuss any concerns. It is particularly important for rural parishioners with concerns to register their comments, as the door to door surveys are not able to include Westwood, Hele, Beare, Blackhorse or Westclyst but your information is equally important.

Derek Button—Annual District Report to Broadclyst Parish



Throughout the year I have tried to keep the Parishes in my Ward up-dated through regular written reports and through articles written for the Broadsheet. Modern technology has enabled these reports to be available to members prior to the meetings and this, in itself, has focused attention, enabling councillors to prepare questions beforehand. I hope to continue this throughout this year.

Much time has been devoted to proposed development in the area. Consultation on the preferred options document relating to the Local Development Framework document finished at the end of November last year. A very

large number of representations were received and have caused considerable concern for some councillors. At the moment, consultants are considering the numbers of dwellings set out in the preferred options document and whether this can be amended given the representations received.

Unfortunately, in early December, the Development Management Committee decided to approve an application for 450 dwellings and associated buildings and infrastructure at Old Park Farm, Westclyst. I believe that the decision was premature in the light of the on-going LDF process and was, in a number of respects, contrary to the East Devon Local Plan. I understand that local residents have written to EDDC informing them of the likelihood of them referring this matter for judicial review. During the year the Section 106 Agreement in relation to the first phase of the

Cranbrook development was agreed and work has recently started on the road infrastructure to service this, the Science Park, Skypark and other proposed development in the area. Consideration has been given to another planning application at Westclyst on land around Pinn Court Farm. At this stage, my view is that this application is also premature in that there are on-going discussions about the LDF and it is also contrary to policies set out in the East Devon Local plan.

One positive outcome during this year has been the much delayed introduction of the new recycling arrangements in November. I am pleased that we are now able to recycle a much wider range of materials including plastic bottles and food waste. It is disappointing that cardboard has not yet been included but I understand that discussions are taking place with a view to including this. Given the increase in purchasing via the internet, the

disposal of cardboard is likely to become a more serious problem unless it can be recycled.

There are still serious concerns about the speed of traffic throughout the village and the failure to resolve traffic flow problems in Old Coach Road, Station Road and the Whimble Road, and a Traffic Group has been set up to work with interested parties in order to seek a resolution to those problems. The Parish Council wishes to publicly thank Roy Elkins and Graham Davidson for their many years serving as Parish Councillors. They have devoted much time and energy to helping resolve community issues and both brought a wealth of local knowledge to council debates. You will both be missed at the council table but will still be busy around Broadclyst.

Red Ruby Devon Beef at Burrow Farm, Broadclyst

When Sally and Neil Grigg moved to Burrow Farm in 2007, they decided to set up a herd of Pedigree Red Ruby Devon cattle. They bought four cows and calves from a local smallholder, and since then have grown the herd to 37 cattle which is increasing all the time.

So what makes Red Ruby Devon cattle so special? "They are a docile breed and make excellent mothers and they thrive on grazing extensive grassland. All our meat is 100% natural and produced on our farm, so you can feel confident that you know exactly where your meat comes from. It's hung for three weeks and has a beautiful marbled effect which makes it very tender" says Neil.

Neil and Sally love the beef so much, that they chose to serve it up for their guests at their wedding last summer which took place here in Broadclyst!

Many of you will have seen the cows happily grazing the meadows along the River Clyst in the summer months. During

the winter, their food is supplemented by silage and crushed barley which is also produced on the farm.

With the emphasis on buying local, and supporting local producers, there has never been a better time to get your beef supply from your very own village. The meat is available to buy in boxes of various sizes (small £35, medium £65 and large £95) but Neil and Sally will also sell individual cuts and packs subject to availability. They will even deliver the meat free of charge within Broadclyst, or you can buy direct from the farm which is situated behind the primary school.

With the summer months approaching the couple have just started selling beef burgers which are 100% beef with no additives except just a little seasoning (packs of 4 £2.99).

Beefy Spring Stir Fry

450g of Burrow Farm Sirloin or Rump steak, cut into strips
1tbsp sunflower oil
1 small red onion, peeled and finely sliced
175g broccoli florets
100g mangetout
100g button mushrooms, halved
1 pak choi, halved
75ml hot beef stock
2tbsp horseradish sauce
1-2tbsp light soy sauce
1-2tbsp sherry vinegar

Heat the oil in a large non-stick wok until really hot. Season the beef with salt and pepper then add to the wok and cook for about 1 minute until browned. Remove from the wok and place on a plate.

Add the onion to the wok and cook for a minute then add the broccoli, mangetout, mushrooms and pak choi. Stir-fry for 3/4 minutes then add the stock and horseradish. Stir to combine

Return the beef to the wok and add the soy sauce and sherry vinegar. Serve with boiled rice

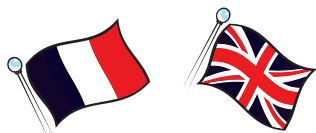

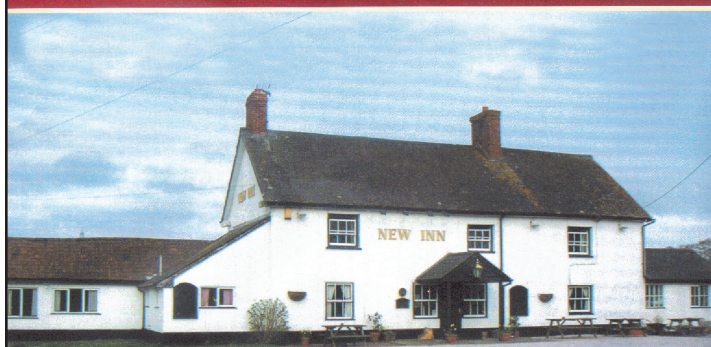

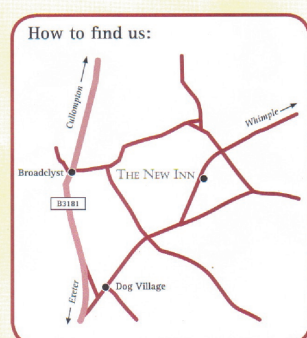

Your neighbourhood Beat Manager : Constable 3210 Buffie Cavin

Unfortunately we are at a time of major change which is not all good. Owing to a major reorganisation of the Constabulary as a result of massive budget cuts over the next few years many things will have to change.

Two of the officers I currently work with out of Ottery St Mary as fellow Neighbourhood Beat Managers (NBM's) are being moved. Pc Kemp with whom I share my hours and my patch, is one and her area of Stoke Canon, Rewe, Brampford Speke, Upton Pyne, Nether Exe and Huxham is to be covered out of Crediton. Pc Kemp is moving to Sidmouth as part of a Neighbourhood PACT (Police and Committees Together) team to address priority neighbourhood issues in East Devon.

Pc Tyrrell who currently covers Whimple, Feniton, Tipton, and West Hill is being

moved to Sidmouth as the Town NBM and his area will be covered by myself and the two remaining NBM'S.

Each NBM will be put on a fixed five- week shift pattern with our working hours and rest days fixed so while at the moment we change our shifts to accommodate the needs and events occurring in our Parishes, this will no longer be the case.

The other changes are not as yet exactly known but it is understood that we will be working as part of a team. I am on section 5 with my sergeant and based at Exmouth. On each shift I will be tasked to neighbourhood issues anywhere in East or Mid Devon. so I presume there will no longer be the luxury of dealing with Broadclyst and Poltimore problems that have not been tasked through the supervisor.

A lot of my work in

Broadclyst came in to me via emails direct form the public. I would like this to continue and still have the amount of time dedicated to Broadclyst and Poltimore but until the new system gets under way on 20th May we won't know exactly how it will pan out. However you will have the extra officers from the PACT team to address reoccurring problems and any Anti Social Behaviour series of crime patterns, i.e. spate of burglaries or damage they will be tasked to address.

Unfortunately this affects my attendance at meetings, surgeries and school inputs and many of my day to day roles will now not be



permitted to happen. Hopefully PCSO Steve Trail might be able to take over some of these. My shifts are now in the main 10 hour Late shifts

The one constant however is that PCSO Steve Trail will remain as your PCSO along with six other villages and much of my role will now be covered by him.

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At the Council Table

Following the calling of the general and local elections for the 5th of May, many speakers booked to speak at the APM planned for April 18th had to pull out due to the strict pre-election purdah rules. The meeting was therefore postponed until May 26th, when Cllr Christine Channon of the county council clarified a few of the issues affecting the village. Citing the demographic statistics and size of developments around the perimeter of Broadclyst, along with the obligations for developers to provide extra schools where required, she explained that as far as she was concerned, Clyst Vale would be retained on its current site, with little or no increase in numbers, for the foreseeable future. Extra secondary pupils from new developments would

instead be dispersed to St Luke's and other schools, while extra primary pupils would initially be dispersed to existing primary schools before the Cranbrook primary school was built.

The traffic group continues to meet once a month, and plans are afoot to calm traffic speeds along the most affected roads in the parish. Council is still inviting any creative ideas to manage traffic at peak times around the schools. Parking is still a problem, with people parking inconsiderately to access the primary school and small traffic incidents occurring near the secondary school due to the awkward road layout. The traffic group is hoping to involve the pupils of both schools in the search for solutions and is in contact with both head teachers.

The parish lengthsman, deployed periodically within our parish to cut verges and keep ditches clear, is yet another service that has been affected by recent funding cuts. We shall in future be having the lengthsman in our parish for two blocks of 10 days per year instead of 3.

The Parish Council is attempting to find a creative solution that will enable the Lengthsman to focus on the more skilled tasks such as drainage and ditch clearance while other less skilled tasks such as corner strimming and signpost cleaning are carried out locally.

We continue to monitor clearance of dog fouling on the village recreation ground and around Broadclyst generally. Initial conclusions seem to be



that there is now a lot less dog fouling on the recreation ground but a more fox fouling is evident. Council will investigate whether there are ways of discouraging foxes from using the field as their latrine. However, we are receiving reports that other parts of Broadclyst are still seeing unacceptable levels of un-cleared fouling: the footpath leading into Poundsland for example. Council will be observing these areas over the coming weeks.

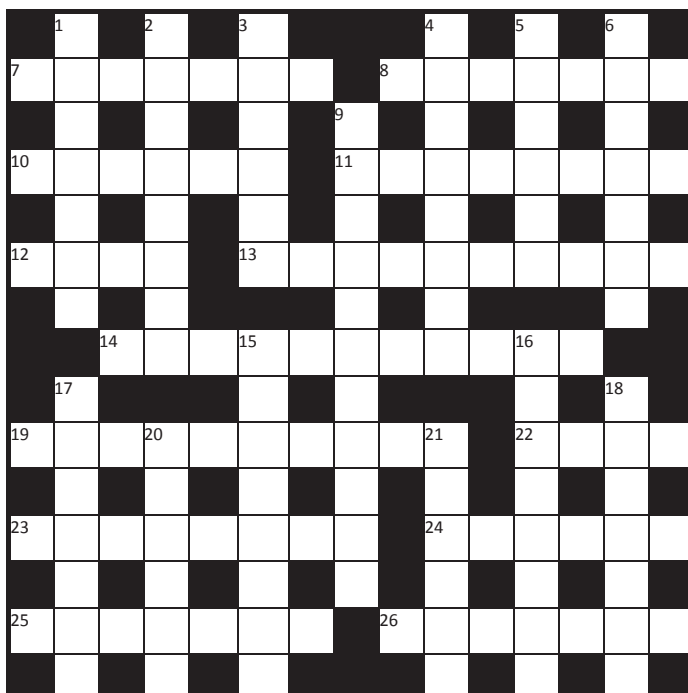

Public Advice from Community Safety Partnership

Community Safety Partnership urges people to 'Mark it, Lock it or Lose it'

The Community Safety Partnership wishes to remind people that East and Mid Devon are two of the safest places in the country to live. Crime figures continue to fall as do reports to the Police of anti social behaviour. However there are still opportunist thieves about and if proper care of property is not taken those persons can still cause a lot of misery. Currently thieves are targeting rural areas and are stealing farm implements etc.

In order to keep crime figures low all of us need to be mindful of the following simple precautions that we should take. At home, always lock doors and close windows, even if you are only going out for a short time e.g. into the garden or to the local shops. Window locks help prevent

easy access to your home. Make a note of the serial numbers and unique identifying marks of any valuable items and mark them with an ultra violet permanent marker pen. Photographing the item is also a good idea.

When you get your tools and lawnmower out of the garage and work in the garden, lock the garage or at the very least don't leave the door wide open. The same applies to sheds and outbuildings. As the summer approaches people will be working in the garden and can be careless. Make a note of any garden tools or equipment and consider both marking and photographing them. With large pieces of equipment such as lawn mowers and hedge trimmers, paint your name and postcode

in large letters on them. Would be thieves can be put off from stealing such items if they are marked in a very conspicuous manner.

If you are a farmer identify your property by keeping a record of it. This should include the serial and model numbers of the item. Paint your names on tarpaulins in letters at least one foot high. Use metal engravers to mark tools, vehicles and equipment with your postcode and name. When you leave your car unattended, even for a short period of time, lock the doors and close the windows and sun roof. Also don't leave anything on display.

Nick Farrell the Police Crime Prevention Officer for East and Mid Devon says 'If the

common sense rules are followed it may well prevent you from becoming a victim of crime. The simple message is mark it, lock it or lose it'

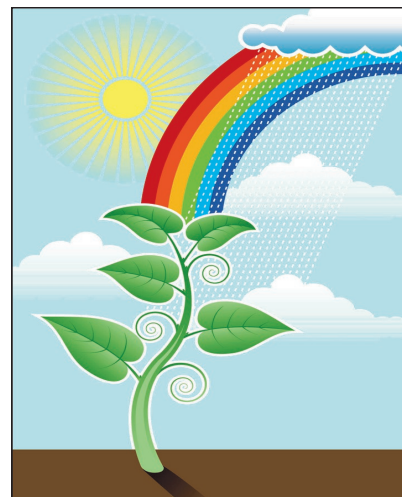

- salt and freshly ground black pepper



How To Cook

1. Roll out the pastry and use to line six 10cm (4") individual tins or foil dishes. If you don't have time to make it from scratch, you can use ready made shortcrust pastry – it works just as well!
2. Boil or steam the potatoes until tender and, while they're cooking, sauté the chopped onions in the oil until really soft.
3. Combine the potatoes and onions, add the butter, parsley, 50g of the cheese, garlic and milk, and season well to taste. Cool, then use to fill the pastry cases.
4. Sprinkle with the remaining cheese and bake in the oven at 220C/425 F/Gas 7 for 20 minutes, until golden. Alternatively, if you prefer to make one large flan, use a 20cm (8") tin and bake for 25-30 minutes.
5. Serve with a crisp green salad or fresh steamed vegetables.
