

Destruction comes to our Parish

The beginning of the end of life as we know it in Broadclyst Parish?



After decades of discussion, the major developments due to take place within our Parish have begun. Bulldozers moved on to the fields next to Bluehayes Lane and started on the infrastructure for Cranbrook this summer. A start was also made on the Junction 29 improvements and the Science Park, with the £3 million cycle bridge over the M5 completed.

Massive infrastructure work has also

commenced to link up the new town and other developments with the new sewage treatment works due to be built

At 0.5 Million square feet, our Parish will contain one of the largest buildings in the area

on the floodplain opposite Clyst Honiton. In a further shock announcement, it was also revealed that Sainsbury's are interested in

building a huge regional distribution centre within our Parish. At 0.5 MILLION square feet, our Parish will contain one of the largest buildings in the area!

Coupled with the proposed Old Park Farm Development in Pinhoe, Pinn Court Farm, Blackhorse and Monkerton/Redhayes Developments, over 10,000 houses are now heading to Broadclyst. *Continued on page 8*

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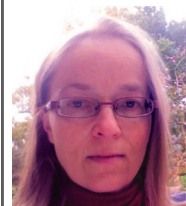

For most materials, recycling on the site is free, the exceptions being building rubble, plasterboard and asbestos, for which charges are made.

Opening hours at the moment are Monday-Friday 8am – 6pm, Saturday 10am-6pm. and Sunday 10am-4pm.

The New Broadclyst Allotments

From a bare field to flourishing vegetable plots in just a few months

It seems just yesterday that the new allotments in Broadclyst were made available, but already a huge amount of fruit and vegetables has been harvested; potatoes, sweetcorn, runner beans, onions and many other crops. I am sure all the plot holders would agree that it has been hard work but well worth it - nothing beats the taste of freshly harvested vegetables.

It is very interesting to see all the different methods being used to grow crops, some using tried and tested methods, others taking a more organic route. Many people who took

on a plot had no previous experience of growing food but have produced some excellent crops and it is encouraging to see many families and children at work.

Some plot holders have erected polytunnels and sheds. One shed in particular was singled out for attention, being taller than average with a very pointed roof and a stained glass window. It is now known as 'The allotment Church', and for a joke someone has attached a wooden crucifix to the roof!

A crop of rye grass also brought many comments - initially sown as a green

manure it was left too long and reached head height with a fine crop of grains. It received a mention on Radio 4's Food Program when it was spotted by a food group visiting with the National Trust. The rye was harvested and some made into bread and shared at the first allotment BBQ, along with corn-on-the-cob and other produce from the allotments. It was all absolutely delicious.

The plots lie in the field behind the long-established Station Road allotments and are managed by an Allotment Association which is responsible for allocating plots



and collecting rent.

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Clyst Caring - Our local charity

How did this very much needed charity come about ?

In 1987, Dr A Walker and Pauline Mortimer approached the Pinhoe Community Association to start a group/committee to form a car service to help patients who live out of Pinhoe/Broadclyst to get to medical appointments in both surgeries. After this had been running for nine years it seemed more practical and sociable to gather people together two or three times a week at the Victory Hall in Broadclyst for Day Care. When the doctors built the new Broadclyst surgery they also purpose- built the Day Care Centre for Clyst Caring which was more suitable for the job.

Clyst Caring opens three days a week - Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays -

from 10am to 3pm, and provides a midday meal. It can take in fifteen people who can be referred through a doctor, nurse or the Clyst Caring Coordinator from the parishes of Pinhoe and Broadclyst. These places are paid for by the clients who use it, by funding from Devon District Council and by fundraising, so allowing the fees to be affordable.

Social stimulation and encouragement

Not only does Clyst Caring operate the Day Care service with fully qualified and caring staff but offers a Home Visiting Service for the isolated, a Short Break Service for carers and a Bathing Service for those who have



difficulty managing on their own.

A car service is available for getting to and from the Day Care centre, or to get to the dentist, optician or chiropodist if necessary. In addition there are various activities and social outings.

The staff at Clyst Caring are kind, friendly and well-trained and the centre is well equipped and airy. With their help the clients are more able to continue to live an independent life in their own home and respite can be given to their carers. The Centre

The running costs of Clyst Caring are rising but funding is being drastically reduced. This amazing service is very important and we would be unwise to ignore the good work that the charity does for our community. Either some of the services will have to be cut or more money will have to be found and more volunteers will be needed to help with this, one of the most important charities in our area.

Drivers are urgently needed (mileage is paid), help is wanted in the centre with the clients and with cooking and fund raising. It can be very rewarding and certainly would be appreciated even if only a few hours a month.

Broadclyst Traffic Group

August has seen yet another serious personal injury occur on the B3181, this time

between Budlake and the village. A car left the road and overturned resulting in at least one occupant being taken to hospital. It seems likely that this incident was caused by excessive speed although this has yet to be confirmed by the Police.

In addition, there have been reports of very heavy vehicles trying to access the Silverton Mill site via the Crabtree route close to Killerton House. This has been reported to the Police who have visited the Mill and advised the owners of the problem. They have agreed to advise drivers to use the specified route to the Mill.

County Highways have also been advised of the need to clear vegetation obscuring signs advising of the correct route. Local neighbours are monitoring the situation and taking note of vehicles which continue to ignore the advised route.

We are disappointed that very slow progress is being made in establishing the Community Speed Watch having been initially advised by Devon and Cornwall Police that local volunteers would have undertaken training for this by the end of July. We intend to

push for progress on this issue. We understand that proposals have been made in relation to alleviating speeding problems at the junction of Old Coach Road and the B3181 and with the Primary School parking project but we are yet to receive written confirmation concerning either scheme. We are in touch with Peter Bowden, County Councillor, regarding local consultation and concerns at the "piecemeal" approach to the wider problem in the Parish.

Progress continues in relation to completing our Traffic Plan for the Parish but we have been delayed by obtaining traffic incident statistics on which to build our proposals and have had to resort to a

Freedom of Information Request which was satisfied at the end of August. We expect to have our report ready for presentation to the Parish Council at their October meeting. Subject to their approval we will then seek consultation within the Parish.

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Destruction comes to our Parish

The news that Sainsburys was planning to build a 500,000 square foot distribution centre near Clyst Honiton was received with shock in July.

As part of the proposal, the developers had been keen to remove the existing planning restriction on night movements of lorries and the requirement that a rail link was put in. Parish Council planning chair Henry Massey stated 'Despite raising concerns, it appears that yet again our voice has been ignored. What was sold

it offers exceptionally low employment

as an environmentally friendly solution combining different transport types has now effectively become a giant warehouse. Furthermore, it



offers exceptionally low employment - with less than 1 job for every 1000 square feet. An office building of that size would offer 5,000 employment opportunities, not just a few hundred. Being built next to the River Clyst and of such a huge size is going to impact heavily on flooding in Clyst Honiton and Clyst St Mary. '.

The Parish Council also expressed outrage that a much supported development of the Animal Kingdom site in Broadclyst was turned down

by East Devon Planning Council as it did not offer 40% affordable housing, yet the Old Park Farm site was given permission with just 30% affordable housing.

Several protest groups have been formed. A group led by our own councillor Janet Byers-Coleman is campaigning against the 2200 homes planned for the Blackhorse area. Helen and Paul Newman and a very active group in West Clyst

are campaigning against the 1000 houses planned for West Clyst. They have even raised the money for a Judicial Review against East Devon District Council, with action due to commence when the final part of planning for the Old Park Farm development is granted.

Although so far only Old Park Farm and the large warehouse have outline permission, developers have made it clear that they will be submitting plans for the other developments over the coming months.

East Devon District Council are presently debating the make up of a new Regional Plan (Local Development Plan). This is due to be finished in the next couple of months, but is likely to recommend the construction of 15,000 houses in East Devon over the next 20 years.

Eleven) was published just over a year ago and I am frantically writing the second in the series, Mdina, in time for Christmas.

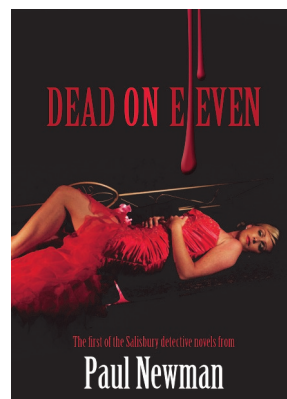
Professionally I am a director of the South West Media Group which, in this area,

Whilst I completely support the need for more housing (particularly at affordable level) I do not believe the use of good food producing land is appropriate at a time when the UK is already struggling to feed its own population. I am surprised that the district council is supporting these applications and question the motivation behind their decisions. If the scale of housing and business premises proposed come to be it could result in thriving small towns like Honiton and Axminster becoming empty shells as greater Exeter will

draw populous away from these communities.

When it comes round to election time again I would urge everyone that is unhappy with these developments to turn out and vote against anyone who is supporting the building of tens of thousands of houses in this area. After all we are supposed to live in a democracy where the opinions of the electorate are listened to. I think our district councillors need reminding of that.



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Broadclyst Buildings - Caddihoe

Tucked away in Ashclyst Forest is a thatched cottage with a few acres of grassland around it called CADDIHOE.

The cottage dates from the 16th Century and the earliest recorded tenant is, Mr George Symes, in 1683. It is believed it was originally a tenanted smallholding and was leased from the National Trust by the Scout Movement in June 1966. The building and land at this time were in very poor condition as it had not been occupied for 14 years.

CADDIHOE FROM THE LATE 1960s. (By Mike Squires of Feebers Cottage, Westwood)

I was living at Topsham and was a Scout Leader for both cubs and scouts. With those groups we made several camping trips to Caddihoe and I started to help Norman (the first Warden of the site) some weekends. About a year later Norman went to live in Scotland and the Devon Scout Association were thinking about giving up the lease on Caddihoe. I felt that would be a great loss and said I would become the voluntary Warden.

At that time, in the late 1960s, the cottage was nearly derelict and the Scout Association funded a new thatch for the roof. The work on the cottage otherwise was undertaken by a group of Venture Scouts who became a weekend "work team". We had trainee electricians, plumbers and carpenters who undertook the work required but with professionals to check the



work. The grandfather of a visiting scout (Chairman of Reeves of Totnes) supplied all the wood we required. For the working weekends my wife cooked for the whole group whilst also looking after our small sons (who were then 2 and a half and 5 years old).

We had more foreign scouts visiting than English

Working on the fields – cutting grass and drainage etc took time but Exeter College had an agricultural unit where the lads learnt to de-coke engines. I came to an arrangement with their Lecturer to use their tractors (a Ferguson T21 and a Ford 3000) alternate years so that the engines would be used. At one point we also had on loan from them a D6 caterpillar for digging drains.

As Caddihoe became well known we found we had more foreign scouts visiting than English – mainly German and French. The French were very keen on their cooking and each year had competitions so we made an arrangement with

a shop at Bradninch to stock French food items. These competitions were judged by Edna, the village policeman PC Moore and myself. At this time apparently they did not have female police in France so PC Moore arranged for a WPC to visit, I felt sorry for her as the French removed all her uniform buttons as souvenirs!

We had a well to provide water both for the cottage and camp site but one summer, when we had a large group of French on site, the well ran dry. PC Moore, who used to keep an eye on the site during the week, arranged for us to go to Beaumont House (then owned by Mr and Mrs Clapshaw) to collect water. The Royal Marines at Lympstone loaned us large water container. Although the well partly re-filled it was decided to sink a deeper bore hole and that was done. We also installed a Coventry Climax search light unit which was re-wired and used to both pump water and light to the cottage. Unfortunately that caught fire a year or so later and was replaced with a Lister Startomatic which remains the

generator to this day.

Edna became rather fed up with cooking for maybe 40 people on a battered domestic stove but the County Treasurer said there was no money for a replacement. However the calor gas supplier told us of a fairly new hotel range which was going cheap (£42 in the 1970s). It is still in the kitchen at Caddihoe now!

We both thoroughly enjoyed our years at Caddihoe and our two sons greatly benefited from the range of people they met there. Some years later my work meant that I was often away for 1 – 2 weeks at a time and I reluctantly had to give up as voluntary Warden.

CADDIHOE TODAY

You will see a separate article in this Broadsheet about the very successful visit of the French children from Plobannalec-Lesconil in July. This was a memorable Community event but only made possible through the original vision of the National Trust and the Devon Scout Association as well as the hard work put in by Mike and Edna Squires and subsequent wardens.

Caddihoe continues to be used by groups of Scouts and Guides as well as being made available to other organisations.

A tale of 5 pubs - The Hungry Fox...again!

It seems a long time since I lost wrote a review for the Broadsheet. Space demands have curtailed my reviews, but not it seems my eating. I had also reached the stage when I had reviewed every pub in the parish (yes - there are five)) as well the other eateries including the mighty Co-Op/ Somerfield! But really, I did not need to worry. At least three pubs have changed management since my last review and Somerfield Café is now the Co-op café.

The Hungry Fox was however my chosen target this month. Few pubs have changed hands as much as the Hungry Fox so I approached this review with much trepidation. We are now in to our sixth manager in 6 years, and our third in one year! They launched a £3.50 carvery 8 weeks ago, and with conflicting comments I headed there last week to sample what

the carvery offered. After much arm twisting I persuaded my friends Alan and Shirley to join me.

The Hungry Fox has been repainted in the last year and has new signs. They've even built a gravelled outdoors seating area in their ample car

the management had changed again - just a week previously

park (a good idea but not quite the same as the New Inn or Red Lion's). I walked in and found the inside nicely painted, but still lacking either the cosy feel of the New Inn or the light and airy feel of the Black Horse - somehow it tries to do both but never quite gets either right.

I was greeted by a young girl and ordered a drink - Alan and Shirley joined me a few

minutes later. It was at this point that we were informed that the management had changed again - just a week previously. The new manager had previously worked for pubs such as the Mulberry in Cheriton Bishop - which has a great reputation. She had scrapped the £3.50 all day carvery (to Alan and Shirley's relief) and was developing a new menu. A sample of the new menu was on the board. I ordered the home made burger, Alan had the haddock and chips, Shirley went for the Belly Pork. The food arrived around 15 minutes later. Both were well presented and with good sized portions (Shirley was unable to eat all of hers - I had no such problem.) All three meals got the thumbs up - the food was not overly expensive, and yes, this was somewhere that we would bring a client or a good friend



for a nice lunch. Alan's haddock had a lovely light and crispy batter, Shirley's belly pork looked fantastic and tasted great as well. My usual burger was clearly homemade with big chunky chips. For dessert we had a chocolate pudding and cheesecake - again - both looked and tasted great.

The problem with the Hungry Fox is that with so many managers and no real love for years, we just don't trust it. Mention its name in the village and you get a sniggered response. It also needs to develop an atmosphere. As a good friend said to me a few days ago - a pub without atmosphere is just a refectory.

Henry Down - a familiar face in Broadclyst

Henry Down is not quite “Broadclyst born and bred” but he has spent most of his life in the village. He was born on 12th October, 1927 in Rewe where he spent his first few years before the family moved to the middle one of three farm cottages at Dunsmore, near Silverton when Henry was about three. At the age of seven he moved with his family to Jarvis Hayes farm cottage in Broadclyst.

Henry’s grandparents lived in the cottage next to Broadclyst Baptist Chapel, and when his

Mr and Mrs Down have two children - Andrew, who is Stores Manager at Beares in Stoke Canon, and Hayley who works for SWEB - and three grandchildren.

Henry, like his father before him, has always worked on the land, doing what he describes as “tractor work, baling and combining” until he retired at the age of 78, though in his younger days all

harvesting was done the hard way, cutting and stacking in sheaves.

You may have noticed a framed photograph on the wall at the Victory Hall of a young seventeen-year-old Henry Down on his tractor. During the Second World War Henry wanted, and actually applied, to join the Royal Air Force, but Mr. Hammett, “the boss” couldn’t manage without his tractor skills and would not release him.

Although Henry retired from farming just six years ago he continues, (at the age of almost 84!) to cultivate his huge allotment in Station Road. Henry’s father originally had an allotment at Silver Wheel in Elbury Lane, he was moved from there to

grandparents died the family took over the cottage, and Henry lived there until he married in 1963. He and his new wife moved back to Jarvis Hayes, where he has lived ever since.

This year is no exception, and the groups who have benefitted are as follows: Twinning association, Bowls club, Toddler Group, Broadclyst VIP's, Theatre group, Parish Church, Senior Footballers, Gardening club, Allotments Association, Killerton, Tennis club, and Sports Pavilion. A further sum of money has been retained for Community use over the next 12 months.

What next?

In the next few weeks debriefing will take place, and then planning for the 2012 Fun Day will commence. The 2012 Broadclyst Fun Day

Committee will be formed and a plan of action drawn up. 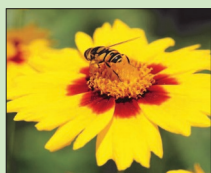

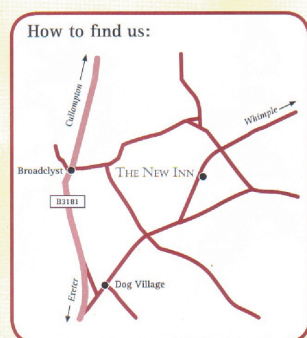

Now that we have settled into our new pattern of life and shift alterations I am able to report that all is very good for Broadclyst and Poltimore.

The main response hub with all the officers that used to work out of Heavitree Road now work from Middlemoor. This results in a much faster reaction time for attending incidents around Broadclyst. As the new policy is that they will send the nearest unit, Broadclyst has benefitted massively.

Also my own personal commitment to Broadclyst in relation to hours worked hasn't altered greatly. I sometimes get sent to incidents outside my area but to date they haven't been too

time consuming and I am soon back on my patch.

However, my duties have changed and you can't guarantee when you will see me. (Having just written this I then spent one of my 7 to 5

shifts attending nine different response incident logs across East and Mid Devon! Never a dull moment and no two days are the same.

On a wider prospective it is also reassuring to note that crime across Devon and Cornwall has dropped across the board and we now have

the third lowest crime rate of all the forces in England and Wales.

The force is also now second in the country in terms of public satisfaction with 67 per cent of those questioned by the British crime survey saying they thought the force was doing a good or excellent job in their area.

But we must never be complacent. We are suffering sporadic theft of garden machinery locally from outhouses and sheds. We must make every effort to ensure that we make the job of the thief as difficult as possible



and thereby putting him off by securing and marking our property. And please report it if you see anything suspicious at any time of day or night (it doesn't always happen in the depth of the night!).

Of Rubbish and Recycling

Council have discussed these a lot over the past few months. It was noted that incidences of fly-tipping have been on the increase since the district council introduced charges for disposing of certain types of waste. In Council in September the decision was taken not to hold the annual parish skip weekend this year as a cost-cutting exercise. Not holding this event will save several thousand pounds of your precept which can be used for other things.

On a positive note, the new recycling centre at Pinhoe (behind Aldi) has been open since June and is, according to reports, fantastic. Council sent their compliments to Exeter City Council in July.

Requests occasionally are made to Council for extra dog waste bins. The decision was

made not to add any further bins as they are expensive to install and even more expensive to maintain. Each bin costs up to £300 per year to service depending on how often it is emptied. It was felt that in these straightened times the ten bins already installed around Broadclyst were sufficient.

Planning

Council continues to be assailed by large-scale planning applications. As volunteers and in council we are spending more and more time dealing with these applications and are beginning to feel that we are spending a disproportionate amount of time on them. The decision was taken in the September meeting to investigate the possibility of setting up separate meetings to deal with them. We still need more parish

councillors to take a share in this work, so please volunteer if you would feel you would like to make a difference in your village!

Policing

Since the spending cuts began biting into active police presence in Broadclyst, there has been a sharp rise in some months in the number of crime reports. This might be circumstantial but it is nonetheless worrying. Council is discussing ways of

increasing police presence in the parish - through use of community police officers for example - but most potential solutions are proving to be prohibitively expensive at the moment. We will carry on investigating options.

Yesterday, as members of the Local Development Framework Panel in EDDC, we were almost overloaded by developers' ideas and opinions of how East Devon should be developed. Acres of land are apparently just waiting to be developed for housing or employment if only we could all agree. It is vital that you, your Parish Council and we (your elected

councillors) do everything we can to ensure that the right decisions are made for the right reasons. We do need homes for young and old alike and we do need jobs so that we can keep the talent that our schools provide. It doesn't mean we should happily fill green fields with houses without just cause.

I will always sing the praises of those who work in their communities for the benefit of all and that is why I am going to say a huge "Thank You" to Roy Elkins. He devoted a lifetime of passion to the Parish and the Victory Hall at Broadclyst and to many other causes beside. He is stepping aside and a new generation is

taking up his many cudgels to give him the time he deserves to take life a little easier. Such work is being recognised and with the support of DCC and locality based budgets we have been able, in just two years, to help support and fund over £10500 of projects in Broadclyst alone, from the Arts Society to the Victory Hall Roof. Long may this work continue.

As your County Councillor my work with the Foster Panel and other social organisations continues. I have been appointed to the Exeter Rail Group and to DCC Development Management Committee where I will continue to voice my concerns

about local developments. The South West Regional Flood and Coastal Committee and the LGA Inland Flood Management Group provides interesting work and decisive conversation. On a daily basis highway and traffic issues abound. Speeding drivers, inconsiderate parking, signage and road repairs dominate the working day. The local traffic group and the Parish Council are doing a lot to ease the problems in Broadclyst and I am pleased to say that we (DCC) are finding ways and means to help. Will it all be done at once, probably not, but I am determined to see it done as soon as possible.

Cllr Derek Button - District Report (Liberal Democrats)



In my last article, I reported on the then current situation in relation to recycling in East Devon. I am pleased to report that the second quarter of 2011 has seen the opening of the new Devon County Recycling facility in Pinbrook Road on the Pinhoe Trading Estate.

The Traffic Group is near to completing its traffic plan and hopes to report it to the Parish Council in October. Should this be

approved, it is envisaged that public consultation should begin then and hopefully be completed by the end of November. Watch out for the plan and let us know your views. In the meantime, the Group does urge local residents to take as much care as possible on our roads and help us to achieve our aims which are to reduce speeds and accident rates within the Parish.

East Devon's Development Management Committee has decided to inspect the proposed site of a photovoltaic generation plant alongside the Broadclyst to Whimple Road in the Forches Head, Burraton area. The site inspection is being held in response to Ward Member

concerns about the proposal and will take place on Friday September 2nd.

As far as future planning goes, the LDF (Local Development Framework) Committee has decided to recommend that the full Council should accept levels of development in East Devon that allow for

15,000 new dwellings in the plan period. In my opinion this is too large a level and threatens open countryside in the Blackhorse and Westclyst areas. Again, local residents have to be very vigilant and make sure that their views are heard.

Bramley Apple Cake

300g/11 oz plain flour

225g/8 oz sugar

150g/3 oz butter

2 egg yolks

Pinch salt

0.5kg/1 lb cooking apples

Juice of 1 lemon

Pinch cinnamon

50g/2 oz raisins

50g/2 oz ground almonds

50 g/2 oz ground hazelnuts

2 tablespoons apricot jam

50g/2 oz icing sugar

2 tablespoons kirsch or cherry brandy

Sieve flour into a bowl, stir in 150g/5 oz of the sugar and rub in the butter. Add egg yolks and salt and mix quickly to a dough. Chill for 20 minutes.

Roll out half the dough to line a 25 cm/10 inch flan ring. Bake blind at 200C, 400F, gas mark 6 for 15 minutes.

Peel and grate apples, mix with remaining sugar, lemon juice, cinnamon, raisins and nuts. Moisten with a little water to blend and spoon into the pastry shell.

Roll out remaining dough to cover the flan and bake in the preheated oven for 30 minutes. Cool in the tin overnight.

Warm jam and spread over the cake. Combine icing sugar and kirsch, spread over the jam and leave to set.
