We had our say!

Nearly 100 people gathered at the Victory Hall on a cold evening in January to help your Parish Council formulate a response to EDDC's draft Local Plan.

The Local Plan will be EDDC's housing and business development plan for the next 15 years and, as we at this end of East Devon bear the brunt of that development, it was crucial that we made our wishes known. It was gratifying therefore that so many committed and erudite people turned up to share extensive local knowledge and expertise to feed into the Parish Council's response.

We are not naive enough to think that we can stop this development at this stage, and in many ways would not want to, as housing development is crucial if our children are to have anywhere to live when they grow up, but we **must** have an influence on it!

The meeting in January was followed by a

further meeting of the Parish Council and the outcome of those meetings fed into what we consider to be a measured but robust response to the plan. We sincerely

hope that East Devon now abides by its stated commitment that *"those being consulted must perceive that their voice will be heard. There is no point in spending time and money on a consultation exercise if there is no willingness to listen to the results"*.

Having concluded the plan response business, the meeting voted unanimously to begin the process of the Neighbourhood Plan, a new government initiative that would give a lot more power back to the parish on the very matters that we are merely having to tolerate with limited input at present.

The only catch with the Neighbourhood

Plan is that it will require fifty per cent of the people voting to support it in a referendum - which of course will require people to vote in the first place! A new parish questionnaire will be drafted this year and delivered to all households. It is



crucial that everyone fills this in and returns it to their local representative as our ability to create a Neighbourhood Plan will depend on widespread support for it.

Please stay enthusiastic and involved - Broadclyst parish needs YOU!

Local girl's epic run for the rain forest

Along with her husband David, former Broadclyst girl Katherine Lowrie is planning a record-breaking, unsupported 5000 mile run from Venezuela to the southernmost point of South America. They will start their run as the Olympic starting gun resonates through the streets of London on 27th July and complete their journey a year later after many tribulations and adventures.

As if running between 15 and 20 miles a day through steaming Amazonian rainforest, over snow-clad Andean passes and against biting Patagonian winds is not enough, they will be undertaking an ambitious project to inspire and link people around the world to South America's wild places and raise up to £50,000 for international conservation charities.

"It's been our dream for years" said Katharine in a recent interview. "We will involve the online community in the

adventures, hazards and highlights, challenges and choices, keeping them up to date with the people and wildlife we meet along the way. The natural world is central to our lives. We want to raise money and awareness to conserve the last threatened ecosystems before it is too late"

spent two years in the Caribbean, surveying the seabird population from their 75 year old sloop "Listalight" which was once the base for Radio Caroline in the Bristol Channel. Their findings have been published recently as "The Seabird Breeding Atlas of the Lesser Antilles"

They are currently looking for sponsorship for equipment, which, most importantly, will include lightweight trailers with the ability to convert to back packs for crossing the Andes.

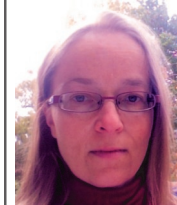

French Christmas Market

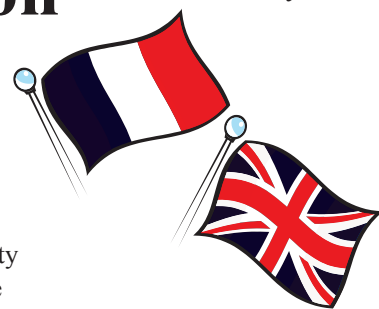

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Mother's Story

Broadclyst Lace Festival 5th-8th July, 2012

A unique private collection of lace gathered over fifty years by Constance Senior of Broadclyst will be on show for the very last time at The Broadclyst Lace Festival between 5th – 8th July 2012.

The collection has been lovingly curated by her daughters Miriam Gent and Mary Schlich, with support from the National Trust. The festival, *Mother's Story*, will showcase Constance Senior's impressive collection within a stunning flower display, and celebrate the history of lace-making in Devon.

Taking place at Broadclyst Parish Church, *Mother's Story* will provide an insight into one woman's passion for intricate design and heritage, in celebration of the work and skill involved in this historic cottage industry.

Constance moved to Broadclyst in 1945, when her husband George Senior was appointed Land Agent for the National Trust across Devon and Cornwall. The family lived at Budlake House just outside the village.



Soon after arriving in Devon, Constance was given an old Honiton lace wedding veil and collar by a local woman, to which she added an Irish lace collar she had crocheted as a child. Constance's passion for lace was born.

She began to search antique shops and auctions in search

of important styles at every opportunity, growing her collection slowly. Fascinated by the many different lace

patterns and their origins, Constance enjoyed nothing more than meeting with fellow enthusiasts to help identify lace, or negotiate the purchase of a new piece to enhance her collection.

As the collection evolved she also began to focus on the importance of displaying her lace. Following her interest in historic lace fashions, Constance began to craft intricately detailed ceramic figures. She would use these detailed figures to demonstrate how lace was worn over the centuries from Elizabethan times, by adding lace panels to their skirts and dresses.

Retiring to Carne Vean, Cornwall in 1956, Constance began to collect lace in earnest and held her first exhibition with her sister soon after. In 1972, she returned to Devon after the passing of her husband George and two

years later, held the first lace exhibition at Broadclyst.

After Constance's death in the 1980's daughters Miriam and Mary began to care for their mother's collection and have done so for the last thirty years. In the 1960's younger sister Mary frequently travelled to London to attend antique lace auctions, to hunt for key pieces to complete the collection. The sisters have twice exhibited their mother's extensive collection, in 1982 and 1993 at Broadclyst Parish Church and have

decided to put it on show once more this July.

The collection includes some fine examples of bobbin and needlepoint lace from many regions across Europe, including examples of the local Honiton pattern. Notable pieces include the lace apron and lappets of Queen Caroline of Anspach (wife of George II), a large triangular Brussels veil as well as a selection of Constance's ceramic display figures.

Constance had a great respect for the skill and patience of the lace-maker and the history attached to the trade. A highly desirable fashion item, there was huge demand for lace across Europe from the late 1500's. In response to this demand, lace making became a widespread cottage industry in East Devon and it is thought that nearly half the local population were involved in the trade during the mid 17th Century.

The renowned local pattern Honiton Lace, distinguished by its use of delicate flowers, sprigs and roses, was gathered from lace makers across the county. At Honiton it was put on the stage coach, and later the steam train to London, destined for the city's fashion houses and markets. Today, there are still a small number of lace makers in Devon and workshops are increasingly popular.



In preparation for the Festival, sisters Miriam and Mary are organising a special workshop with the National Trust, focussing on effective exhibition and display techniques. Volunteers are very welcome to attend the event. If you are interested in being part of the Broadclyst Lace Festival please contact Miriam Gent on 01392 467288 to discuss how you could help. All proceeds from the Festival will be donated to the Clyst Mission Community and Clyst Caring Friends. Make sure to put the date in your diary and tell your friends.

The festival will be open on Thursday to Saturday (5th - 7th July) from 10:30 am – 3:30 am and 11:30am – 6pm on Sunday 8th July. Stalls and refreshments will be available in The Victory Hall.

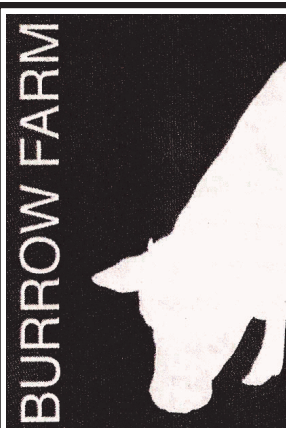

Imagine being alerted to these and other everyday household noises by a specially trained dog provided by Hearing Dogs for Deaf People, a registered charity which since 1982 has aimed to improve the quality of life for people with impaired hearing.

Before a dog begins its specialised training around the age of 12 months, it must learn to 'socialise' in a variety of everyday situations and the charity is actively seeking volunteer Puppy Socialisers in the Broadclyst area. Puppy Socialisers in partnership with Hearing Dogs take a young puppy into their homes, full time, for around 12 months, teaching the dogs basic social skills.

'Our Puppy Socialisers perform a vital role in the initial training of our dogs and we value the contribution they make very highly,' said Lucy Dacre, Hearing Dogs Volunteer Co-ordinator.

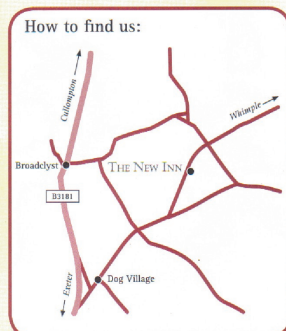

Village Signs

Look out for the 2 new Broadclyst signs which will soon be in place on the B3181 at either end of the village. One of the signs will be officially “unveiled” during the French Twinning visit in May. The Traffic Group is spearheading a plan for more ambitious, impressive, stone-built features to be erected. They are currently seeking sponsorship for this project.

Response to Draft Local Plan

In January there was a well-attended Public Consultation meeting in the Victory Hall. The Parish Council had a

further meeting to formulate its response taking into account the views expressed. There is great concern in the parish about the amount of development taking place, the loss of good farmland and the speed with which decisions are taken. We hope that our input will be considered carefully and some of the changes we suggested put in place.

Traffic Group report

There was a good response to the questionnaire and the report will be amended and presented to the March meeting. Work has already started to improve Old Coach Road for residents.

Jubilee celebrations

There will be several events in the village to celebrate the Queen’s Diamond Jubilee, including a party organised by Villagers Improving Play and a seniors’ cream tea in the Victory Hall. These will be supported by funding from the Parish Council. We are all hoping for fine weather for the extended Bank Holiday weekend.

Whimble Road

The road we all know as “Whimble Road” is not in fact officially registered with any name at all. This can cause problems for residents attempting to register their details online as there is nothing to put in the “street”



field and forms are often rejected. Council approved plans by a resident to set in motion the formal registration process, which firstly involves gaining the approval of a majority of affected residents. The process will begin this spring.

This is your annual public meeting when you can have your say and contribute to the plans and actions for the coming year.

Cllr Peter Bowden - County and District Report (Conservative)



For both East Devon District and the County Council February is a month when budgets are finally agreed and levels of Council Tax are decided. Neither authority will set precept increases themselves, but small increases arising from the Parishes and larger increases from the Fire Authority and the Police will see tax bills rise slightly. Fortunately Locality, and Discretionary budgets have been retained which allows us to continue

supporting local parish groups with funds. I am delighted to say that grant funding has recently been found for Clyst Caring Friends and the Carousel Projects to help both the elderly and young children within our very rural parish.

County officers continue to work towards the proposals set out by the Broadclyst Traffic Group. Modifications to village signs and a revised road layout at the top of Old Coach Road will soon be completed, whilst plans to help resolve the parking problem at our Primary School are moving forward. The comprehensive plans and ideas contained in the Traffic Plan document deserve support and I will continue to seek permissions and funding wherever I can.

While you may be wary that

reducing budgets must mean cuts to services, I am pleased to note that many services have improved while Audit and Ofsted Inspections of DCC Children's Homes, setting up Health and Wellbeing Boards, Academy school start-ups and our financial operations have all been praised, and Youth Services have had their budget increased to take account of additional children regarded as vulnerable and in need of added care.

A matter of concern relates to the existing 2008 agreement between the Government and the Association of British Insurers which runs out in 2013. Recent headlines in the local press indicate that cover will be withdrawn from homes that have a history of flooding. East Devon has hundreds of such homes and we continue

to talk to MPs, Ministers and others to reach an understanding that makes sense. E-mail me at peter.bowden@devon.gov.uk if your home may fall into this category and I will acknowledge your concern and ensure you are put on to a risk register. We really must find a way forward as soon as possible.

Finally, in a discussion with EDDC Portfolio holders regarding Waste Management and Re-cycling, it is planned to include the addition of items such as mixed plastics and cardboard into the recycling collection. I hope this can be arranged sooner rather than later - good news indeed.

Cllr Derek Button - District Report (Liberal Democrats)



At the time of writing, it's late February and there are obvious signs of Spring all around us.

Councils all around the country are going through the final stages of the budgeting process. Here in East Devon it's likely that we will see a small increase in the Council Tax due to increases in the Police and Fire Authority precepts. Many people have expressed to me their surprise and disappointment with the

decision of the Fire Authorities decision to allow increases in allowances for members in the order of 25%. I keep being asked "How can this be justified when everybody else is being asked to cut back?" I haven't heard anyone yet provide an answer to that question.

At the local level, work has started on improving parking in Wiltshier Close. The existing grassed area becomes very muddy and churned up in wet weather and it is hoped that the new grass-crete surface to be provided will improve the situation. It is unfortunate that we will lose one of the trees but I am pleased to report that another is to be planted in the nearby area.

Work has also started upon improvements at the junction of Old Coach Road and the B3181. It is hoped that this will serve to improve traffic flows and reduce the speed of vehicles negotiating this junction. The local Traffic Group continues to believe that closure of the junction allied to other local measures would be more effective but welcomes this attempt to improve the situation in the short term.

The National Trust has agreed to undertake works in Sunnyfield to help improve the condition of the road surface in the area of Wiltshier Close/Clyston Mill Lane. It is to be hoped that this work will commence as soon as possible.

I would like to thank all residents who responded to the EDDC Consultation Document ref. the new Local Plan. I know that there have been many representations of concern relating to the scale the development proposed for our area. I share those concerns and have written to the Council accordingly. Do I believe that the proposals will be modified as a result of these representations? I think it fair to say that I am deeply sceptical!

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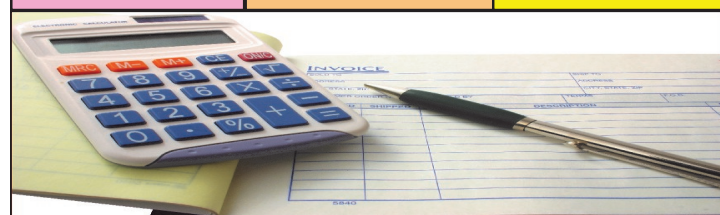

VIP - Villagers Improving Play

In 2009 several mothers wondered whether they could improve the facilities for their children in Broadclyst so the VIP's were formed with the support of the Parish Council and National Trust. Timings fell just right, and following many hours on consultation and a very lengthy application process, Broadclyst was fortunate enough to be awarded one of the government's now-withdrawn PlayBuilder grants of £45,000. This resulted in the design and installation of the magnificent new play

equipment you can see today, in the play area on the

recreation field in Broadclyst.

The VIP's have recently secured lottery funding, which



together with some Section 106 money will be used to create a Teen Zone, as they are very aware there is very little provision in the village for youngsters once they outgrow the play area.

In the same breath, VIP's would like to reassure our young people that the long-awaited BMX track has not been forgotten. It is hoped the minor stumbling block which came to light when applying for change of use on the land that was put aside for the track will soon be overcome. There is a great need

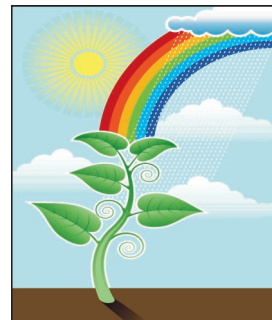

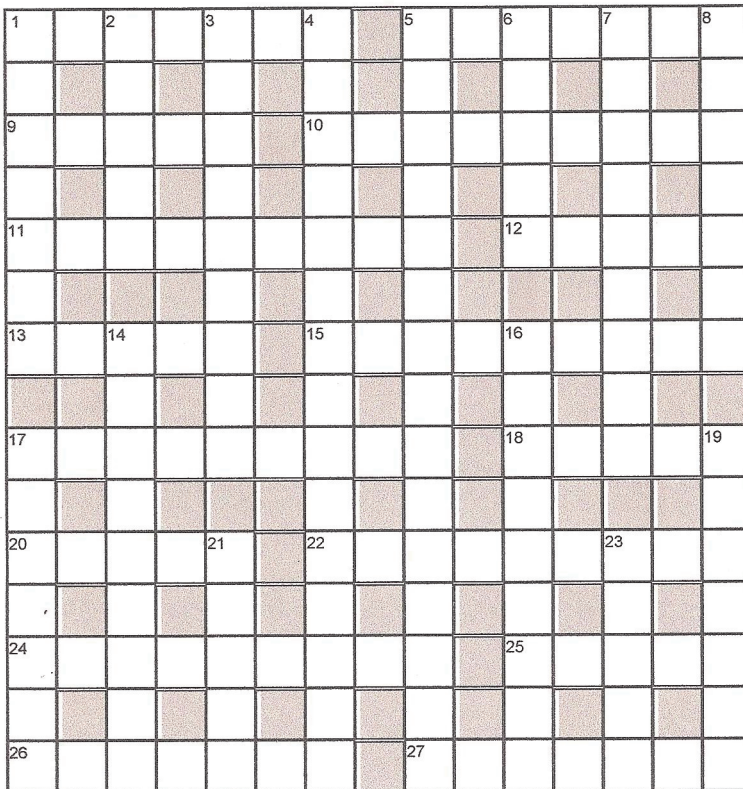

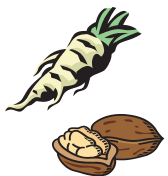

Jane Grigson's Parsnip and Walnut Fritters

To serve 6



- | | |
|-----------------------|-----------------------|
| 1kg/2½lb parsnips | 17cl/6fl oz milk |
| 2 large eggs | salt and black pepper |
| 1 tbsp flour | 4 oz walnuts |
| 90g/3oz melted butter | oil for deep frying |

Trim and peel parsnips. Boil in water till tender.
 Drain, mash or press through sieve or mouli, discard tough bits and core.
 Mix to a smooth paste with the eggs, flour, butter and milk.
 Season and stir in broken up walnuts.
 Heat the fat and fry a dessertspoonful or two of the mixture at a time
 (making sure there is some walnut in each fritter) until deep golden brown.
 Drain the fritters on kitchen paper.
 Delicious served with game bird or beef or topped with a chunk of blue cheese.
