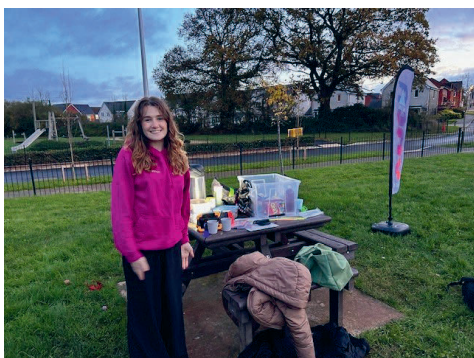
Broadclyst (Thursday) - Our work in Broadclyst continues, with an exciting new initiative called "family dinner" which we do once a month. During these sessions, we invite anyone who is in Year 8 and up to come and join us, where we cook dinner and eat with the young people. Attendees who want to participate are invited to help in the cooking and also in the cleaning up afterward. From June, we will be inviting Year 5s to join us at our younger youth club, which runs from 4.30pm-6pm. The Year 8s will be moving up to our 6.30pm-8pm slot, ahead of the next school year, to give

them time to settle into their new age group before September.

Tithebarn - We have had multiple trips to Tithebarn to chat with young people in the area, where we have met with some families and young people. We are still looking for more young people to come and talk to us about the work we do, so please say "hi" if you see us out and about. A pop-up youth club took place at Exeter Science Park on 3rd June from 5.30pm - 7pm which encouraged young people to come along and bring their ideas. The more we hear what you want, the better your youth club will be!

We are looking forward to having our first youth panel later in June, which will eventually be made up of young people from all youth clubs, although members will be young people from Broadclyst and Westclyst areas to start with, while Tithebarn is still forming.

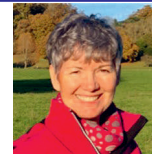

Broadclyst: Five Years of Flour Power, Flying Eggs and French Friends!

It's hard to believe that five whole years have passed since Broadclyst first rallied together in response to the Pandemic challenges of March 2020. What started as a community support initiative by the Parish Council has grown into something extraordinary – the Broadclyst Food Bank. Whether you were packing bags, delivering essentials in sideways rain, or quietly making it all happen behind the scenes, you've been part of something special.

To celebrate this milestone, the Annual Parish Meeting this year was more than just minutes and motions – it was a chance to recognise every volunteer who has stood in the porch with a box of pasta and a smile. Thank you for five years of showing what real community spirit looks like.

And speaking of celebrations... **Broadclyst Fun Day returns on 28th June**, and with it, the **now-legendary Egg Throwing Competition**. Last year's champions set an astonishing record (and probably ruined a few shirts in the process). Expect stalls, sunshine (we hope), and slightly terrified egg-catchers. It's a highlight of the parish calendar – don't miss it!

Meanwhile, on the international front (yes, really), our twinning relationship with the picturesque Breton town of **Plobannalec-Lesconil** continues to flourish. If you've ever dreamt of a weekend filled with seafood, cultural events, and warm French hospitality, **now's your chance**.

Eleanor Rylance and the Twinning Committee are finalising plans for this July's visit to France, and they need to know who's hopping on the ferry – *pronto*. Whether your French is fluent or firmly “menu-only”, there's a place for you. And all for around £100 and a thoughtful gift for your hosts. C'est fantastique!

And finally, a massive win for our parish's future: thanks to nearly **£8.5 million in Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL)** funding approved by East Devon District Council, Broadclyst and neighbouring communities are about to see some serious upgrades. Highlights include:

- £4.5 million** for a brand new primary school at Tithebarn.



£1.38 million for a beautiful 10-hectare country park off Station Road – opening this autumn!

£1.8 million for the much-anticipated Mosshayne Lane to Station Road Multi-Use Path.

And **£800k** towards expanding Pinhoe Surgery, boosting health services across the area.

Whether you're lobbing an egg, lending a hand, learning a bit of French, or just loving the lane improvements, our parish is proof that when a community comes together, brilliant things happen.

Archaeology @ Tithebarn

What's in a Name?

As you make your way through the new housing off Tithebarn Way, you may have wondered how the street names of the new neighbourhood were chosen, and what they mean. New street names are usually chosen by the housing developer(s), then reviewed by the local planning authority.

Street names can reflect the farms, fields and woodland that existed before the new housing. Sometimes, there is a smattering of names of local dignitaries, past and present.

At the Equinox and Cherrywood Grange development, some names were already in place as the centuries old network of roads, tracks and paths were incorporated into the development scheme. Tithebarn Lane, Langlands Lane and Mill Lane reflect how the local parishioners accessed their farms, fields and other places of work.

Many of the newly created streets have intriguing names, which have less obvious origins. These were chosen to reflect the finds from a series of archaeological excavations that took place ahead of the house building programme. These finds show that communities have been living in the area for thousands of years.

The earliest evidence comes from the Mesolithic (Middle Stone Age), some 9,000 years ago, when nomadic hunter-gatherer communities were reoccupying the British Isles after the end of the Ice Age. They left behind scatters of stone artefacts - tools for cutting and scraping wood, plants, and animal hides, as well as axes for heavy work and arrowheads for hunting. The Neolithic (New Stone Age), from around 6,000 years ago, saw the introduction of cultivated crops, domesticated animals, semi-permanent houses and the first clay pots. A row of Neolithic pits, containing flint tools and broken pottery, was found under what is now Sharlands View. From these distant times we have Flintfield Way and Arrowfield Road.



In the Bronze Age (2500BCE – 750BCE) leading members of the community were buried, often with grave goods, in round earthen mounds called barrows. Barrows have been excavated at the Lidl and Amazon depot sites, at St James' School (Cranbrook), under Garland Meadow and beside the junction of Tithebarn Lane and Langaton Lane. Ancient bone does not survive very well in the local acidic soils, but finely-decorated Bronze Age pottery beakers and urns have been found. Rubbish pits, field boundary ditches and the postholes and drainage gullies of thatched roundhouses have also been found. This period, including a particular type of Bronze Age pottery called 'Trevisker Ware', and the find of an amber bead have given us Bronze Drive, Trevisker Gardens and Amber Rise.



Central to a major excavation in 2015-16 was a large enclosure, with a substantial defensive ditch, now bisected by the Pin Brook. This was first recorded as an archaeological cropmark in the dry summers of the 1980s. The recent excavations suggest that the 'Pin Brook Enclosure' started in the Iron Age (750BCE - 43CE), but was also in use during the Roman period (42CE – 410CE) and even into the early medieval period (or 'Dark Ages').

The enclosure may have been a low-lying version of an Iron Age hillfort, serving as a place of refuge for people, agricultural produce and livestock and also for community gatherings, festivals, industrial production and trading. Roughouts for Iron Age armlets made out of Kimmeridge shale, and a stone for grinding cereal grain to flour, have given us Armlet Row, Shale Row and Quern Rise. A sloe stone, found in the early medieval recut of the ditch, has been scientifically dated to between 640CE and 769CE. This was a period when the eastern part of British (or 'West Welsh') Damnonia (Devon and Cornwall) was being absorbed into the Saxon kingdom of Wessex.

Other finds from this period of the enclosure's use included eight ovens, or kilns, for drying harvested wheat, barley and rye. These incorporated the characteristic pinky-purple volcanic stone, quarried from places such as Rougemont, that is found in the city wall and town houses of Roman Exeter (Isca Dumnoniorum). It must have been recycled from a ruined Roman building.



Other archaeological excavations, at the Amazon and Lidl depots, and more recently at Cherrywood Grange, have found the square, ditched enclosures of three Romano-British farmsteads. More of these, providing essential food and other goods for the Exeter market (and taxes for the Empire), would have been dotted along the roads leading into Roman Exeter. Evidence from these farmsteads, and from the Roman phase of the Pin Brook enclosure, suggests that iron smelting and smithing was an important activity – not surprising for an agricultural community. More surprising was the discovery of a Roman sword amongst smithing waste at the Cherrywood Grange site. It is hoped that we can say more about this sword in a future issue.

Another startling find from the early medieval, or later into the medieval period, was a burial ground within the Pin Brook Enclosure. This consisted of 97 graves. No bone survived and the only artefacts found were a few pieces of medieval pottery and a couple of shoe buckles.

The Roman and medieval periods have given us the street names of Iron Acre, Rougemont Drive, Sloe Gardens, Kiln Corner, and Buckle Rise.

The archaeologists have moved on to other sites, but, as you travel the local paths, lanes and roads, spare a thought for the names that you see, and for the many generations and past communities that have made the place that we now call home.

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Summer at Killerton

Woodland and Tree Safety

As Rangers at Killerton, the year is split in two:

March-August is the growing time of year where we're typically focusing on access, engagement, surveys and grass; then September – February is the felling (and planting) season when we're at our busiest. Unfortunately, this coincides with the storm season! Following the recent trend of strong storms back-to-back, the 24/25 winter was no exception.

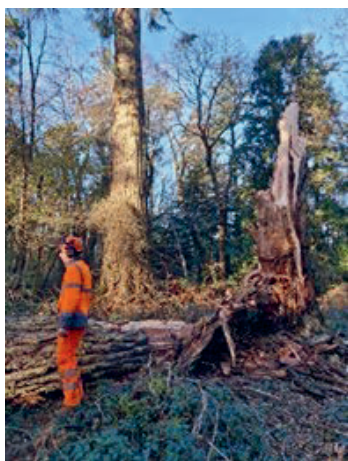
Storms Bert and Darragh were the most damaging, hitting the estate from the SW and NW. Between them and the other minor storms we lost approximately 500 trees.

It's not all doom and gloom though as it's a natural process in woodland management, creating both opportunities for new growth through increased light levels and providing deadwood (40%+ of woodland

wildlife are reliant on deadwood and I view it as the bottom of the food chain).

As you may have seen around the estate, we're also busy planting trees, having planted another

80,000 trees across the Community Forest and hedgerow projects in addition to annual beat ups across other recent woodland plantings. That's not including natural regeneration which thrives across the estate.

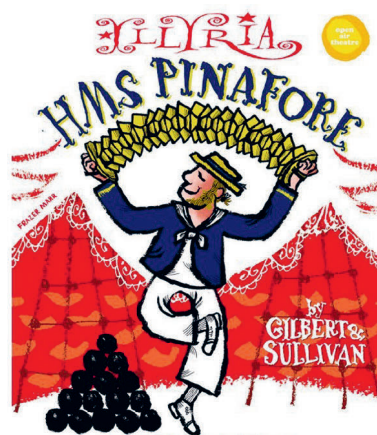

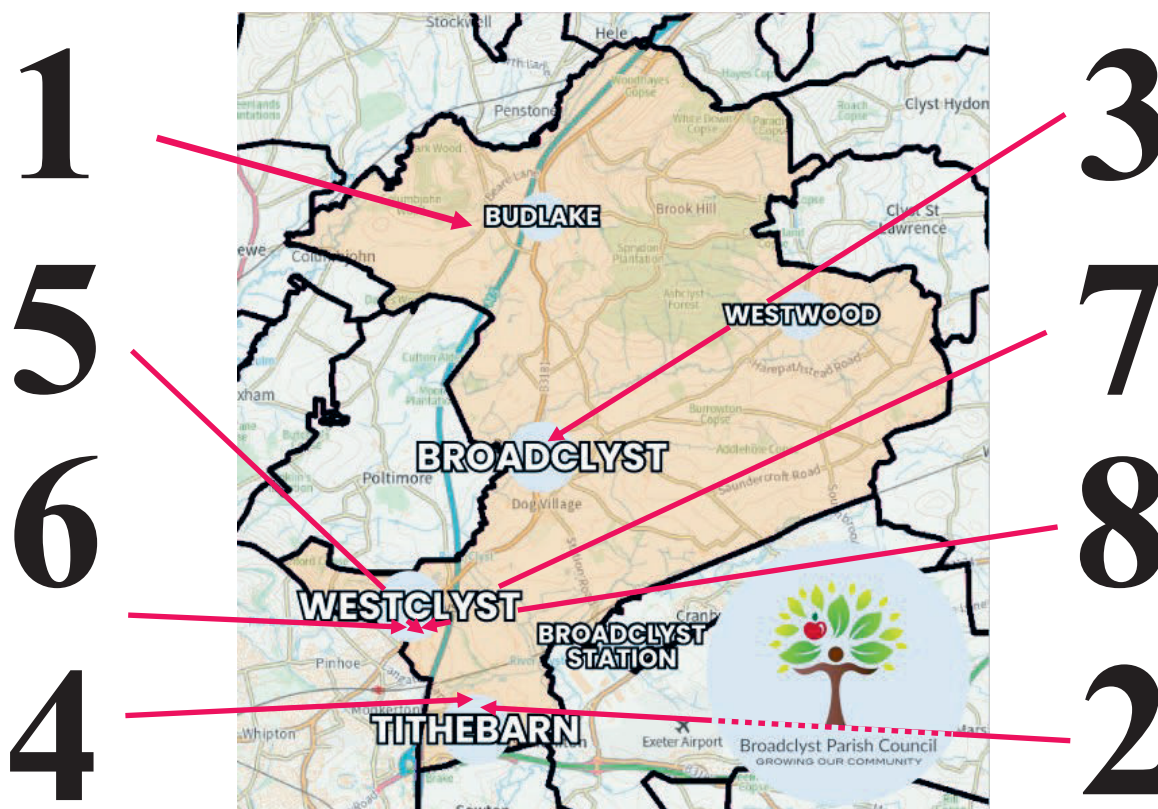

Redhayes Green Corridor, Tithebarn

Farley Grove, Westclyst

Investing in Our Parish: over £8 million of Community Infrastructure Levy Funding Approved for Broadclyst

At a meeting in May, East Devon District Council allocated money that they have been collecting from developers through the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL). The allocations were spread across East Devon, but most of the money was spent in and around our parish:

Tithebarn Primary School £4.5m was allocated towards the £6m that is currently estimated as the cost to build a new “single form entry” school. The new primary school will be built to support families in the growing Tithebarn community, reducing pressure on nearby schools and ensuring that local children can go to school close to where they live. Funding is conditional on detailed costings from Devon County Council.

Pinhoe Surgery Extension £800,000 was allocated to provide six additional clinical rooms at Pinhoe Surgery. We hope that the threat of closing the list to new patients will be averted, to include increased patient numbers from new housing developments.

Clyst Meadows Country Park, Station Road, Broadclyst

£1,383,000 was allocated for a new 10-hectare country park, being created off Station Road, to provide high-quality green space for local residents and to protect the nearby Exe Estuary and Pebblebed Heaths from recreational pressure. Known as Suitable Alternative Natural Greenspace (SANG), the park will also support



biodiversity, link to the wider green corridor network, and promote wellbeing through access to nature.

Mosshayne Lane to Station Road Multi-Use Path

£1.8 m was allocated for this section of the off-road walking, wheeling, and cycling route between Cranbrook and Exeter, which will go through Tithebarn. The route will include a new bridge over the Clyst near the railway line and will go around the back of the Lidl site.

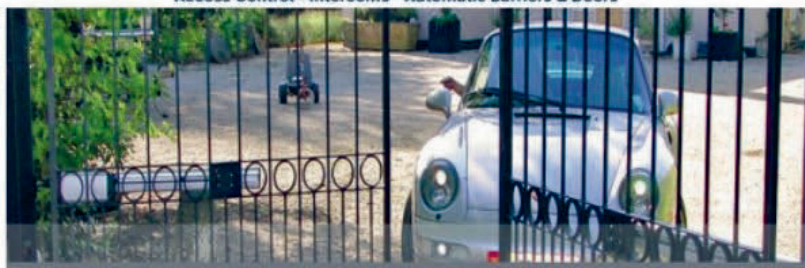
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My Carbon Literacy Journey: Small Steps, Big Impact

Earlier this year, I took part in Carbon Literacy Training, a nationally recognised course designed to help individuals understand the causes of climate change, the impact of our everyday actions, and - most importantly - what we can do about it. The course was organised by Broadclyst Parish Council and delivered by East Devon District Council's Climate Officer, Catherine Causley, and her team. It took place over two days and included a mix of classroom and online learning.

We were set some pre-course homework as part of the accreditation requirement. I watched David Attenborough's Climate Change: The Facts on BBC iPlayer. I needed tissues! I can honestly say it affected me more than I expected, and I began the

course feeling like there was no hope. But as I worked through the modules, my perspective changed - the course gave me something I hadn't expected: **hope**.

It helped me understand that the climate crisis isn't just a global emergency - it's a local one too. From how we heat our homes and travel to work, to the food we eat and how we shop, every decision carries a carbon cost.

One of the most useful parts of the course was calculating my own carbon footprint, using the WWF Footprint Calculator. It gave me a clear and simple baseline to work from and showed me that even small changes can make a big difference.

The WWF Footprint Calculator is a great tool for anyone starting out.

It's easy to use, clearly presented, and breaks down your impact into sections. There's also a companion app, which I've started using. It offers articles, podcasts, videos, and challenges across four areas: nature, travel, home, and food. It's packed with helpful tips to support you and your family in making positive changes.

But climate action doesn't stop at home. As part of my Carbon Literacy certification, I've made a workplace pledge to become Broadclyst Parish Council's Climate Champion. I'll be using the Broadsheet magazine and the Parish Council website to share practical, local tips on cutting carbon - from energy-saving ideas to low-waste living. With over 3,000 households in the parish, even a 10% shift could lead to hundreds of

tonnes of CO₂ saved every year.

I'll also act as a point of contact for residents and councillors who want to calculate their carbon footprints or are simply looking for ideas on where to start. If each of us takes just one small step, the impact we can make together is enormous.

This isn't about being perfect - it's about being better, together. I'm excited to continue this journey and help make Broadclyst a greener, healthier, and more resilient place to live.

Cold Callers and Doorstep Traders

From time to time, residents may be approached by cold callers - people who knock on doors without an appointment, offering goods or services.

These may include offers to clean driveways, repair roofs, sell household items, or carry out garden work.

While some of these individuals may be legitimate, others can be persistent or pressurising, and some may not be genuine at all.

Broadclyst Parish Council encourages residents to be aware of their rights and to stay safe when dealing with unexpected callers.

What You Can Do

You are never under any obligation to speak to or buy from someone who comes to your door uninvited.

If you are not comfortable, it is entirely acceptable to say no politely and close the door.

You do not need to explain your reasons or give any personal information.

Who to Contact

If a cold caller makes you feel unsafe, is aggressive, or you suspect criminal activity:

- Call 999 if you feel threatened or the situation is an emergency.
- For non-emergencies or to report

suspicious behaviour, contact Devon and Cornwall Police on 101 or online at

[devon-cornwall.police.uk](https://www.devon-cornwall.police.uk)

- You can also report concerns about rogue traders or scams to Citizens Advice Consumer Service on 0808 223 1133, who work in partnership with Trading Standards.

Please do not report cold callers to the Parish Council, as we do not have the authority to act on these matters.

Practical Tips

Displaying a "No Cold Callers" sticker on your front door can deter unwanted visits. These are

available online or from Devon and Cornwall Police. If you do decide to engage a trader, ask for full written details, and take time to check references or reviews before agreeing to any work. Do not let anyone into your home unless you are completely sure who they are.

Looking Out for Others

We encourage community safety and for neighbours to look out for each other. If you have elderly or vulnerable neighbours, consider checking in with them if you know cold callers have been in the area. Together, we can all help keep the parish safe and welcoming for everyone.

Successful “Night Bus” Scheme to Run in Broadclyst Parish

Devon and Cornwall PCC

Following the success in the summer and Christmas of 2024, Devon & Cornwall Police and the Police and Crime Commissioner’s office are working with partners to continue running night buses, providing seven new routes (in addition to the four existing routes from last year) which includes the 1A route through Westclyst and Broadclyst.

Alison Hernandez, Police and Crime Commissioner for Devon, Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly, said: “I am delighted that my office will once again fund this fantastic service and help even more people get home safely after a night out. I need people to use these services to show it is

commercially viable to ensure it becomes a mainstay of having a night out.

“Night buses in Devon and Cornwall have been proven to be a great success, reducing crime and antisocial behaviour and making people feel safer – with the added benefit of allowing them to get home for less than the cost of a pint or a glass of wine.”

Night bus services, provided by Stagecoach in Devon and First Bus in Newquay, will operate on Saturday evenings from May throughout 2025 in a bid to reduce drink and drug-related incidents.

The buses will also be available in Devon on

Friday, December 19, and New Year’s Eve.

The North Devon, Torquay, Plymouth and Exeter buses will run between May 31 and New Year’s Eve 2025, and a longer Newquay service until September 6.

Tickets for the services cost a maximum of £3 for a single journey and £4.50 for a “Niterider”. Full timetables for Devon are available on the below website:

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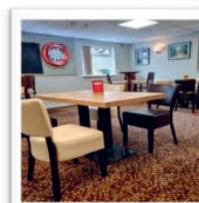
